A Broad Lace of 5 Loops

The broad lace is explained here with using departed (=linked, bicolour) loops, because this makes it easier to keep track of the *upper* and *lower* shank of the loop. The Broad Lace of 5 Loops will only look right if all the loops are picked up *reversed*, e.g. so that the upper and lower shank switch places when switching sides.

Make 5 departed loops and set them up as follows: 3 loops with the darker colour up on the index, middle and ring finger of the left hand. 2 loops with the lighter colour up on the middle and ring finger of the right hand, leaving the index finger free. Thumbs are only used as helpers and this pattern does not need to involve the little fingers at all.







Figure 1 The start position for a 5-loop braid with departed loops






Put Ra through Rb and pick up lower shank of Lc, pull through.
